Included in this series are George Borton's account book, 1866-1878; testimony regarding Robert Walker, 1786, by the Brighthouse Monthly Meeting; Cadbury family genealogy; genealogies of the Cope, Garrett and Price families; 2 facsimile letters, 1657 and 1660 by William Dyre [Dyer]; 3 letters dated 1785, and translated from French from Friends in France; a large size, exhibition copy of the indictment by the Gestapo of Leonhard Friedrich, a Quaker, from 1942 and notes from a 1947 speech during which he chronicled his imprisonment in Buchenwald; letters of Herbert Hoover to Levi Pennington, 1925-1963 (xerox copies); issues of the *Maryville Monitor*, 1872 and 1873; letters, accounts, and petitions, including a letter from John Hancock, 1777, concerning some Quakers sent into exile to Virginia during the war, as well as a photo of Brown House where they were incarcerated (added Oct., 1978); two issues of the *Social Magazine of the Penn Literary Society*, 1838; and a testimony for Esther Tuke in 1794 by the York Monthly Meeting (England).

- "Translation of a letter from some Quakers in France to Edward Fox, in consequence of an advertisement from him, dated 2nd mo. 1785, to refund his father's share of prize money to the sufferers in sundry captures of a privateer whereof his father was part owner, amounting to several thousand pounds sterling," (ms. copy sent to "Massey Ellis, Muncy"?). 7. Friedrich, Leonhard:

- blowup, exhibition copy of indictment notice from the Gestapo, in German, dated September 18, 1942, citing the reason for arrest as his "politically negative attitude to the National Socialist state, evidenced by his pacifist and pro-Jewish attitudes, particularly in the context of his prominent role in the Society of Friends (Quakers)."

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7. Friedrich, Leonhard (continued):

- translation of that notice by Paul Oestreicher, June 11, 1986.
- "Notes of a talk given to an audience in Bad Pyrmont in the autumn of 1947, reprinted in "Der Quaker," July 1975, 50th Anniversary Edition," chronicling time spent as an inmate in the concentration camp Buchenwald from 1942-1945. Also included in the speech are the lyrics to a song written by a Jewish inmate.

8. Hoover, Herbert Clark: photocopies of ca. 100 letters from Hoover (TLS), 1925-1963 to Levi T. Pennington.

- This collection is primarily acknowledgments of letters sent to Hoover, but includes letters discussing Hoover's Committee on Food for the Five Small Democracies (Dec. 1940), a press release regarding the disarmament conference in Geneva (June 1932), honorary degree from Pacific College, and Boys Club of America.
