ABSTRACT

Essays written by Howard Yarnall (1899-1945), a Quaker, during a trip to Germany in 1933-34 where he visited Friends and attended Germany Yearly Meeting.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

Howard Yarnall (1899-1945) was the son of David G and Florence P. Yarnall. After attending Earlham College for 2 years, he received both a B.A. (1923) and M.A. (1931) from the University of Pennsylvania. He was sent to Germany as a representative of the American Friends Service Committee in 1924 to assist with relief work with children. He worked with Philadelphia Young Friends from 1925 -27. In 1933, Yarnall returned to Germany and received a Ph.D. from University of Gottingen. In 1935, he m. Helen Thiede and moved to State College where he taught German at Pennsylvania State College. Yarnall was very active in the State College Friends' Meeting, though he retained membership in Monthly Meeting of Friends of Philadelphia.
