BIOL 107 *Biology of Infectious and Parasitic Diseases.* Lecture course, presenting basic cell biology, microbiology and immunology to non-science majors.

- BIOL 150 *Cell Biology: The Basis of Life.* Lecture and laboratory course, introducing cell structure and development, genetics and evolution, includes labs on plant genetics, bacteria and phage growth, protein evolution and fish development.
- BIOL 200 *Cell Structure and Function*. Lecture and laboratory course, focusing on chromosome structure, RNA and protein processing and transport, cytoskeleton.
- BIOL 252 *Women, Medicine and Biology.* Lecture and discussion course with community placement, examining the biological descriptions of women's bodies and behaviors, and the medical profession responses to women's health concerns.
- BIOL 248 *Disease and Discrimination*. Lecture and seminar course, examining the nature of discrimination against individuals and groups with infectious diseases, the biological basis of selected diseases and cultural representations of illness.
- BIOL 300 *Laboratory in Electron and Fluorescent Microscopy*. Laboratory course, analyzing the ultrastructure of vertebrate tissues by transmission electron microscopy and the structure of the cytoskeleton by immunofluorescence.
- BIOL 307 *The Cell in Development*. Lecture and discussion course, with writing-intensive option, analyzing developmental processes, including cell determination and differentiation, developmental genetics and morphogenesis.
- BIOL 354 *Molecular Mechanisms of Disease*. Seminar course analyzing current research articles and examining the interplay between basic research and medicine.
- BIOL 359 *Molecular and Cellular Aspects of Pattern Formation*. Seminar course in developmental genetics, analyzing current research articles on segmentation/homeotic genes in *Drosophila*.
- BIOL 403 *Senior Research Tutorial in Developmental Genetics*. Laboratory course in basic research, using microscopy and molecular techniques to study the genetic control of development in the nematode *C. elegans*.
- ENGL 101 *Freshman Writing.* Discussion and tutorial course analyzing literary works focusing on infectious diseases (leprosy, plague, influenza, AIDS).
- GNST 290 *Interdisciplinary Perspectives in Gender and Sexuality Studies.* Seminar course using contemporary feminist and queer scholarship to examine gender and sexuality as marks of social and cultural difference.
- HLTH/ICPR 115 *Introduction to Health Studies.* Multidisciplinary introduction to the minor in Health Studies examining essential concepts of health studies—mechanisms of diseases and maintenance of healthy bodies; cultural and ethical representations of health and illness; social determinants of health and societal structures that enable or limit access to health.
- HLTH/ICPR 233 *Community Engagement and Social Responsibility.* Seminar linking community engagement opportunities made available through offices and programs in the Bi-Co to theories of injustice, direct service, and social transformation. Examines how structural violence, interpersonal power dynamics, and personal agency influence individual behaviors and outcomes; how solidarity models of community service differ from charity models; how privilege and cultural biases shape how we see other communities.
- HLTH/ICPR 281 Violence and Public Health. Interdisciplinary seminar analyzing the advantages and limitations of a public health perspective on violence. Examines how interpersonal, collective, and structural violence affect public health, as well as evidence that violence is preventable and amenable to public health strategies.

- HLTH/ICPR 311 *Reproductive Health and Justice.* Seminar course examining disparities in reproductive health outcomes, access to sexual health care, and protections of reproductive rights within Nicaragua and the United States.
- HLTH 398 Senior Seminar in Health Studies. Required culminating seminar, which integrates the three tracks of the Health Studies minor: mechanisms of disease, prevention and treatment; cultural representations of health, illness and healing; and social factors that structure risk for disease and access to healthcare. Explores the theme for this semester's seminar, Indigenous Health and Well-being, through assigned readings, documentaries, public health datasets, government and tribal documents, and discussions with visiting speakers.
